After training with Asai Sensei for three years, I realized that I hardly knew ANYTHING about him.

In the martial arts especially, the Sensei would strictly adhere to this tradition. FORMALITY AND RESPECT ARE THE KEY INGREDIENTS TO AN EFFECTIVE DOJO ATMOSPHERE!! They felt that making friendships or getting too close to students would cause a breakdown in the teacher-student relationship. Formality and respect would begin to wane and cause them to be less effective teachers. You see, in martial arts, you are taught how to defend yourself against aggressors in life-threatening situations. As a Sensei, being able to instill some amount of fear in your students can be an effective teaching tool. That CANNOT happen when your students are also your good friends!!

When I started teaching karate, I found myself mirroring the same behaviors of my Sensei, and it felt very natural. The training was cold and very businesslike. You come, you train, and you leave! There was very little interaction between and among members, or, for that matter, between the Sensei and the student! I carried on this tradition for many years, even after starting HSK, although I slowly introduced fun activities to foster camaraderie and socialization among our members. Thus, the "softening of Sensei" began!! Curiously, it wasn't until around 2007 that my fear of "losing control" in the dojo was laid to rest. Does that date sound familiar? Yes, that is also the date that granddaughter Rylynn was born ... AND when my "amazing transformation" took place!!! I have taught SO many nice and truly wonderful people through the years that came and left, and realized that I never REALLY got to know them! I also realized that this was something that I was missing out on! Who wouldn't want to have MORE nice and wonderful friends?

After starting so many activities and events where our students could mingle and socialize with one another, I began to witness something quite extraordinary. Our members found reasons other than karate to return to the dojo — the friends they have made!!! So many close, strong and lifetime friendships were created at HSK thanks to my realization that karate can be SO MUCH MORE than physical it can also be the ingredient that can soothe and energize one's soul!!!


