This God-forsaken pandemic has taught ALL of us the value and necessity of continuing our social ties with each other. IT HAS KEPT US SANE!!! I now realize more than EVER how extremely blessed I am, and have been, to have such loving, caring, and supportive people in my life!

HSK lays claim to not only exceptional and superior teaching and training methods, we have also demonstrated our commitment to help our State and communities through fundraisers and blood drives. Although our karate is stellar, that is NOT how I want to define us. There has ALWAYS been a desire in me to help others. Teaching karate is ONE way! My years at McKinley High School as a digital media and STEM teacher, as well as an advisor for our IGNITION program to help incoming freshmen transition successfully to the high school environment, transformed this desire into a calling!
